

Asking Youth About Their Kin | Why it Matters



Elevating youth voice can help make the best placement and offer children some sense of control in a traumatic time.



Youth know their kin best. Talking with them opens opportunities for preservation of family, culture, and community.



Fictive kin can serve as a bridge for teens. Relationships like coaches and friends' parents can be especially important for teens going through a tough time and might otherwise get overlooked.

What You Can Do to Support Your Staff in Engaging Youth




Prioritize time to train staff on the importance of engaging with youth about their kin



Introduce tools & activities (like a heart map!) to use with youth to learn more about their supportive adults



Use existing checkpoints and conversations with staff to check-in, see how it's going & back them up



A **Heart Map** is a visual aid that is used to ensure that youth in care maintain bonds with significant individuals in their lives, helping to provide continuity, support, and normalcy.

Asking Youth About Kin Multiple Times in Multiple Ways

Conversation starters for building rapport with a child/teen

- Tell me about your day. What did you do? What classes did you have?
- Are you involved in any sports teams or after school clubs? Who takes you to practice?
- What is your favorite subject? Do you have a favorite teacher or other adult at school that you go to for help?
- What do you do for fun?
- Who does your family spend time with? Does your grandma or aunt ever come around? What about other relatives? Who else is in your family?
- Who do you hang out with in the neighborhood? Do you ever go to your friend's house? Do you know their parents?

What is a question you use to engage youth about who they trust and feel connected to?

- Who came to your birthday party?
- Where and with who do you spend holidays with?
- If you had a magic wand and could reach out to one person from you past that you miss who would it be?
- If you had to call someone for help, who would that be?
- Who do you share good or bad news with?
- If you're having a bad day, who is someone you feel comfortable sharing that with?
- Who gives you the best advice?
- If (XYZ depending on age, i.e. a flat tire for a teen) who would you call?
- Who is the first person you think of when you want to share something you are excited about with someone?


