KinFirst is an approach and mindset for organizations and systems involved in the lives of families, young people, and children. This is driven by a belief that all families have strengths and will be honored as experts of their situation.

KinFirst culture requires a mutual understanding that families, young people, and children deserve a sense of belonging. Building a KinFirst culture requires equitable investments, expectations, training, coaching, policies, practices, and partnerships that prioritize family and kin. This community commitment and vision is guided by values and behaviors that recognize the power of family and connections to strengthen outcomes for social determinants of health and to build networks of support.



Shared Values Across Programs

- The voice of family and kin are valued in ensuring safety and permanency of children and youth
- We believe families and youth are experts in what they need to ensure safety and well-being
- A family's community, culture, heritage, and affirmed SOGIE are intrinsically important to well-being
- Collaboration and innovation in child-serving systems with families and stakeholders are essential in supporting families individualized needs
- Connections and permanency for all children involved in child serving agencies is urgent and nonnegotiable



Values

- All young people have a right to develop a robust network of supports.
- Lesbian, gay, trans, queer, and gender expansive young people thrive and succeed when families, schools, and communities support and nurture their evolving identities
- Rejecting parents or families can become accepting and affirming of their LGBTQ+ children with appropriate support



Values

- Variations of sexual orientation, gender identity and expression are part of the normal spectrum of human diversity. The increased risks faced by LGBTQ+ young people are not inherent to their identities but stem from the stresses of prejudice, discrimination, rejection, and mistreatment
- Efforts to change a young person's sexual orientation or gender identity are harmful, unethical, ineffective, and unnecessary






Experience homelessness




Have lower rates of reunification with their families of origin

Goals

Through partnerships with families and systems and co-creation of solutions:

Young people and families:

- Increase acceptance and decrease rejection of a young person's unique SOGIE
- Young people increase their overall physical and emotional health and well-being
- Increase family and caregiver use of LGBTQ+ resources and supports
- Develop a network of accepting and affirming emotional supports
- Safely increase affirming family connections and chosen family relationships with the goal of establishing relational permanency
- Provide LGTBQ+ youth in foster care an opportunity for legal permanency through reunification or placement with accepting and affirming kin or other adults

Chosen Affirming Family Finding

Say.

Building a robust network of **affirming** individuals who provide belonging, emotional and potentially legal permanency.



Outcomes & Impacts

Reduced entry into childserving systems

Decreased unnecessary congregate care placements

Increased permanency outcomes (reunification, guardianship, adoption, legal and relational)

Decreased disparate outcomes experienced by LGBTQ+ in child welfare
